To Poles, this eagle symbolizes the fiercely independent spirit of Poland, and its proud history of victory over its many occupants. The part eagle is enclosed within a square, a direct reference to the Festival's annual venue - Fed Square in Melbourne. The festival logo encompasses the use of Polish national colors: white and red.



is based in Melbourne, Australia. Under the Artistic Direction of Merited Artist of Ukraine, Melanie Moravski Dechnicz, the shares the vibrant Ukrainian culture.







In their 9 year history Lehenda has wowed audiences across Australia, Canada and the USA. Lehenda perform regularly at many mainstream festivals, events and private functions and have also toured with 3 full length productions: KAZKA – fairytale of love, loss ... and a mysterious blue fox (national and international), LEGEND – Stories of a Nation (national) RAZOM – Two Nations one Spirit (national).

Lehenda's offspring – The Lehenda School - leads Ukrainian Dance Training in Australia, offering classes in Ukrainian dance, Ballet and Acrobatics. We have opened our doors to newly arrived Ukrainians offering free tuition. We also welcome two wonderful, talented new teachers to our school from Kharkiv - Hanna Lazarieva and Kristina Botsvina.

Lehenda Ukrainian Dance Company is honoured to represent the Ukrainian culture. It is our mission to advocate for Ukraine and the Ukrainian culture through dance, to our fellow Australians and the world.



Łowicz

Łowicz, established in Melbourne in 1975, has a long and rich history of promoting Polish folkloric culture. Łowicz has had the honour of performing at numerous interstate events including the triennial PolArt Festival, and countless festivals and events in Melbourne. Łowicz is an active group within the Polish and wider communities, organising multicultural concerts, galas, and



various fundraising events. After a rich 40-year history, in 2015, the group was overjoyed by its growth to welcome a cohort of budding young dancers into the junior troupe, our very own 'Łowiczaki.'

This year Łowicz were delighted to bring Polish dance to the wider community through the Dance Up! Australia program together with the Southern Migrant and Refugee Centre, the Polish Community Council of Victoria, and the Polish Community Care Services, while also representing the Polish community at Charity events for Ukraine.



Since its humble beginnings, the heart of Łowicz lies within the members' enthusiasm and passion for upholding Polish culture and traditions, and the vision and guidance of the Ensemble's respected Artistic Directors, both past and present.

Currently, the group's Artistic Director, Edith Drajkopyl, teaches the Senior group, with fellow past

member Olivia Winczura teaching the Junior group. Both teachers bring with them a fun atmosphere to learning Polish song and dance and are supported by experienced dancers in the ensemble.

Polonez Song and Dance Ensemble

POLONEZ Song and Dance Ensemble, was formed in 1965, in order to practise and promote Polish song & dance. With this aim, it has performed widely both in Victoria, around Australia and overseas in Poland, Lithuania and Ukraine. It has attended all 14 Polish National Festivals (PolArt) held throughout Australia, and 3 Festivals of Polish dance Groups from around the world, held in Rzeszów, Poland. Its first visit overseas was to attend the famous Kwiaty Polskie Festival in Vilnius (Wilno) Lithuania.

POLONEZ supports local Polish and multicultural community events, organises the Polish debutante balls and regularly presents full length concerts, the most recent being at the Clocktower Theatre, Moonee Ponds. The Ensemble is very much looking forward to its 60th Anniversary, which it hopes to celebrate in the style it's known for.

POLONEZ has always been a family oriented community ensemble, based very much within the core of Polish community life from which its draws its strength, support and inspiration. Barbara Czech is the Artistic Director.

A few facts about Poland

Poland's flag is white and red. The colours were adopted in 1831 and the national flag was officially adopted in 1919.

The National emblem features the White Eagle and has been Poland's coat of arms for a thousand years. Legend has it that the White Eagle emblem originated when Poland's legendary founder Lech saw a white eagle's nest. When he looked at the bird, a ray of sunshine from the red setting sun fell on its wings, so they appeared tipped with gold; the rest of the eagle was pure white. He was delighted and decided to settle there and placed the eagle on his emblem.

Poland has been invaded or has fought for freedom in insurrections 43 times from 1600 to 1945.

The highest mountain in Australia was named in 1839 by Polish explorer Sir Paul Edmund Strzelecki as Mount Kosciuszko because of the mountain's resemblance to the Kosciuszko Mound in Kraków, Poland.

Poland's anthem is Dąbrowski's Mazurka.

The capital of Poland is Warsaw.



The national holiday is Constitution Day, May 3.

Poland's currency is the złoty (PLN).

The area of Poland is 312,679 sq km (120,728 sq mi).

Poland is part of the European Union, NATO and the United Nations.

Poland boasts 17 Nobel prize winners, including four Peace Prizes and five in Literature. Polish born Marie Curie Skłodowska (1867 – 1934) was the first and only Nobel laureate in two different sciences and first female professor at the Sorbonne University.

Famous musical composer Fryderyk Chopin was Polish.

Polish born astronomer Nicolaus Copernicus (1473–1543) was the first person to propose that the earth was not the centre of the universe.

Saint John Paul the Great – Pope John Paul II – also known as Karol Wojtyła (1920 – 2005) was Polish.

Victoria's Polish connection



- Victoria has the highest concentration of people of Polish decent in Australia with almost 62,500 residents.
- In 1839, Sir Paweł Edmund Strzelecki made a geological and mineralogical survey of the Gippsland region of eastern Victoria, where he made many discoveries. He is credited for naming Mt Kosciuszko, Gippsland, Lake King, Perry River and the Strzelecki Ranges.
- During World War I, a Polish Fund Committee was formed in Melbourne. With considerable help from Dame Nellie Melba and other prominent Australians. The Committee collected funds to assist the victims of war in Poland.
- After WWII, from 1947 to 1954 60,000 displaced Poles called Australia their home. Today, there are over 180,000 Poles living throughout the Australian states and territories.
- The Polish Community Council of Victoria Inc. (Federacja Polskich Organizacji w Wiktorii) was established in 1962 as the state's peak Polish organisation or federation of Victoria's Polish associations, organisations and individual grouping of Polish migrants.
- Polonez Polish Folk Song and Dance Ensemble of Melbourne, was formed in Melbourne in October 1965. Generations of Poles have now participated in Polonez with current membership at 100 singers and dancers.
- ZHP, the Polish Scouting Association in Victoria, has conducted its scouting activities continuously for more than 60 years in Victoria including representing Polish Australian Scouts at World Jamborees.
- In 1973 Cardinal Karol Wojtyła, later Saint John Paul II, blessed the Polish Marian Shrine in Essendon.
- During the period 1980–1991 there was another wave of Polish migration to Australia as a result of the emergence of the Solidarity trade union movement and the declaration of martial law in Poland at the end of 1981. Many of these migrants arrived as refugees.
- In 2005, the Victorian Department of Primary Industry created the Strzelecki Awards. Named in honour of Polish explorer and mineralogist, Sir Paweł Edmund de Strzelecki, the awards recognise outstanding achievements in the area of sustainable development within the Victorian earth resource industries.


