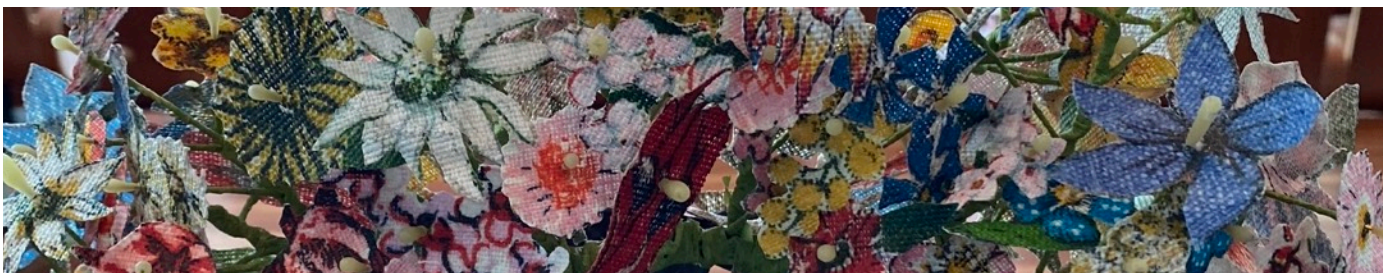

Polonez Song and Dance Ensemble



POLONEZ Song and Dance Ensemble, was formed in 1965, in order to practise and promote Polish song & dance. With this aim, it has performed widely both in Victoria, around Australia and overseas in Poland, Lithuania and Ukraine. It has attended all 15 Polish National Festivals (PolArt) held throughout Australia, and 3 Festivals of Polish dance Groups from around the world, held in Rzeszów, Poland. It's first visit overseas was to attend the famous Kwiaty Polskie Festival in Vilnius (Wilno) Lithuania.

POLONEZ supports local Polish and multicultural community events, organises the Polish debutante balls and regularly presents full length concerts.

The Ensemble is very much looking forward to its 60th Anniversary which it hopes to celebrate in the style it's known for, with a grand Debutante Ball in May 2024, a large-scale reunion of POLONEZ members from all



ages , including our special Foundation members, late 2024, leading into a spectacular concert in early 2025, followed by PolArt, overseas for the first time, in Wellington, NZ, at the end of the year.

POLONEZ has always been a family oriented community ensemble, based very much within the core of Polish community life from which it draws its strength, support and inspiration. Barbara Czech is the Artistic Director, Helene Miałczygrosz, Jacqui Paszkiewicz and Joe Pawlicki, instructors.



Artur Gotz



Artur Gotz is a Polish actor, vocalist, producer and author of lyrics and music, director of concerts and radio plays. He was born in Krakow, Poland and now lives and works in Poland's capital Warsaw.

Artur has been performing on stage since the age of eleven, and by 15 years of age, he began working with The Imagination Theatre in London. Artur has produced 5 albums featuring a variety of songs. The fifth album, "Artur Gotz for Children. Fairy

Tales and Songs", is a unique family album and features songs with music by Artur Gotz and lyrics by Marta Fox and Artur Gotz, in modern arrangements using electronic instruments. The album includes two fairy tales in the form of radio plays: "Toruńskie Pierniki" by Artur Gotz and "Smog Nas Zje" by Marta Fox. The album is the artist's debut as an author of music and lyrics and it is also the debut album for the youngest audience.

Artur Gotz has played over 650 solo concerts throughout Poland, as well as in Europe. He has travelled to the USA on 4 x national tours, as well as two concert tours in Australia, New Zealand and Cuba.

Artur is also a frequent guest on popular Polish television programs and Polish radio broadcasts. He has directed many concerts, as well as several radio plays and a series of audiobooks.

Winner of the International Consul General Award of the Czech Republic, in 2013 he received the Artistic Scholarship of the President of the City of Łódź, in 2014 the Scholarship of the Capital City of Warsaw, twice Scholarship holder of the Minister of Culture and National Heritage (2020 and 2022). Winner of the following awards: "Vocalist of the Year 2015" and "Vocalist of the Year 2016".

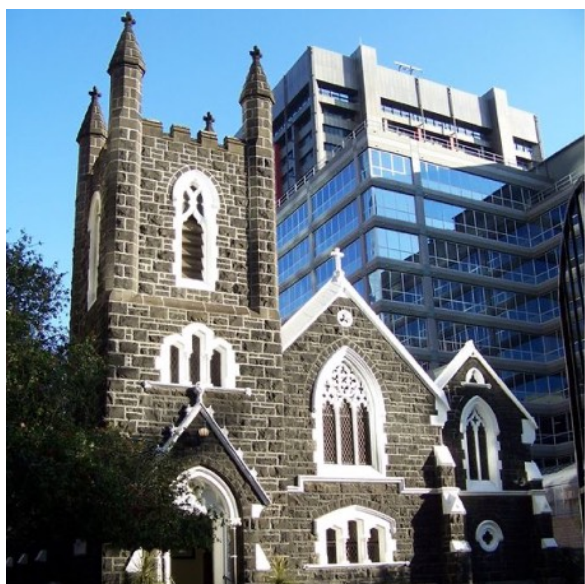




Richard Stacewicz is honoured to have performed for the Polish Festival @ Fed Square in Melbourne since the first Festival in 2004.

The Clinch Quartet – Tribute to Tomasz Śpiewak

Peter Clinch (1930-1995) will always be remembered as Australia's most influential classical saxophonist, a true pioneer, who singlehandedly gave Australia's saxophone

scene world fame, with an extensive career as a soloist, renowned teacher and leader of his own quartet.

One of the long standing members of the original Peter Clinch Saxophone Quartet was saxophonist, multi-instrumentalist, composer and lecturer Lachlan Davidson. Early 2020 Lachlan came in contact with two outstanding Victorian performing artists: baritone specialist Sara

Beale and alto saxophonist Martin Hemingway. Two exceptional saxophonists and teachers, trained in the superb tradition Peter Clinch had set up at The University of Melbourne, two young people who had already set up a colourful and inspired career of teaching and playing in many genres (classical, contemporary, folk-music, funk). The fourth member was an absolute newcomer to the scene: Dutch tenor saxophonist Niels Bijl. Member of the world famous Aurelia Saxophone Quartet for 17 years, with an international career as a performing artist, spanning 20 years and 4 continents, and a brand new resident of Victoria since January 1st 2020.

Their first rehearsal was an immediate success. A unique mix of four different individuals, who turned out to be kindred spirits, with similar plans, hopes and dreams. Within weeks, their first recording appearance in the Melbourne Recital Centre was a fact, and an abundance of repertoire and project ideas started coming their way. It was no more than natural to embrace Lachlan's immediate suggestion to name this brand new chamber music ensemble after the most iconic saxophonist Australia has ever known: The Clinch Quartet.

Saxophone Quartet - 1988

Chorale

Allegro Molto

Saxophone Quartet is arguably one of Spiewak's finest compositions. It was commissioned by the Peter Clinch Saxophone Quartet for performance at the World Saxophone Congress in 1988 in Tokyo. This quartet is a work in four movements, today we will be presenting two. Chorale's sonority is created by a series of parallel fifths, this movement was Spiewak's favourite composition. Allegro Molto is an exciting, energetic movement in sonata form.

Sonatina for Soprano Saxophone and Piano - 1988

Tomasz Spiewak dedicated this work to Peter Clinch. He viewed this piece as one of his finest works for saxophone. Spiewak characterised himself as a pedagogical composer, evidence of this can be found throughout this work. He was interested in twelve tone writing, though he wasn't always strictly adherent, often making alterations to create more pleasing results. The second movement of this piece references the bird calls from the family of blackbirds that inhabited Spiewak's backyard. Today, the first movement of the Sonatina will be performed by Lachlan Davidson and Peter De Jager

Baritone Suite

Tomasz first began working on this piece in 1998. This work was first conceived to be a collection of jazz/modern pieces for his dear friend Ian Godfrey, but it remained unfinished. Tomasz was inspired to finish the work with encouragement from Ian for Sara to perform in her final Master of Music Performance recital in 2006. Today Sara will be performing two movements from this Suite, *Tango* and *La Cancion* with Peter de Jager.

Associate Artist Peter De Jager:



Peter de Jager is a pianist, harpsichordist, and composer based in Melbourne. His career has encompassed every style of Western classical music as well as music theatre and cabaret. He is in demand as a solo and collaborative keyboardist, and has had compositions commissioned by several major Australian ensembles. He is currently on staff at the Australian National Academy of Music and the Melbourne Conservatorium of Music as a collaborative pianist, and teaches at the Australian Institute of Music. Current projects include completing a PhD in Spanish Renaissance music, singing in the Royal Melbourne Philharmonic Choir (and occasionally playing the piano in rehearsals), and learning the oud.

Martin Goes to School

Martin Goes to School is a movement from the Quartet titled, "Martin's Day" written by Spiewak in 1986 for his son Martin. In keeping with Spiewak's interest in composing with external stimuli, this movement is a light-hearted boogie woogie that cleverly conjures the image of little Martin walking to school.

Paderewski Tour 2023@ Polish Festival, Fed Square

Aleksandra Świgut, pianist, a graduate and teacher of the Fryderyk Chopin University of Music in Warsaw, a triple prize-winner of the 17. Edward Grieg's International Piano Competition in Bergen: she received second prize, audience prize and orchestra prize.

Runner up of the 1st International Chopin Competition on Period Instruments in Warsaw (2018). She is represented by the Ludvig van Beethoven Association under the patronage of Elżbieta Penderecka.



Her wide experience with historical and modern instruments and different performance practices makes her interpretations unique.

Unmatched energy and exceptional understanding of the epoch it originates from – these features make Aleksandra Świgut an outstanding musician who plays on both modern and early instruments with the same ease.

She studied at the Fryderyk Chopin University of Music in Warsaw, Katowice Music Academy and Guildhall School of Music in London. She holds a doctorate from Gdańsk Music Academy on “Historical Piano Performance contra Twentieth-century Performance Practice”. She gained experience on historical piano and harpsichord.

Semi-finalist of the International Artur Rubinstein Piano Competition in Tel Aviv and participant of the XVIII International Chopin Piano Competition in Warsaw. She has won many prizes in piano competitions for young pianists, including in Ettlingen, Enschede and New Orleans and at the Polish Chopin Competition in Warsaw. She has appeared at festivals in Nohant, Paris and Duszynki-Zdrój, as well as the Beethoven Easter Festival and ‘Chopin and his Europe’.

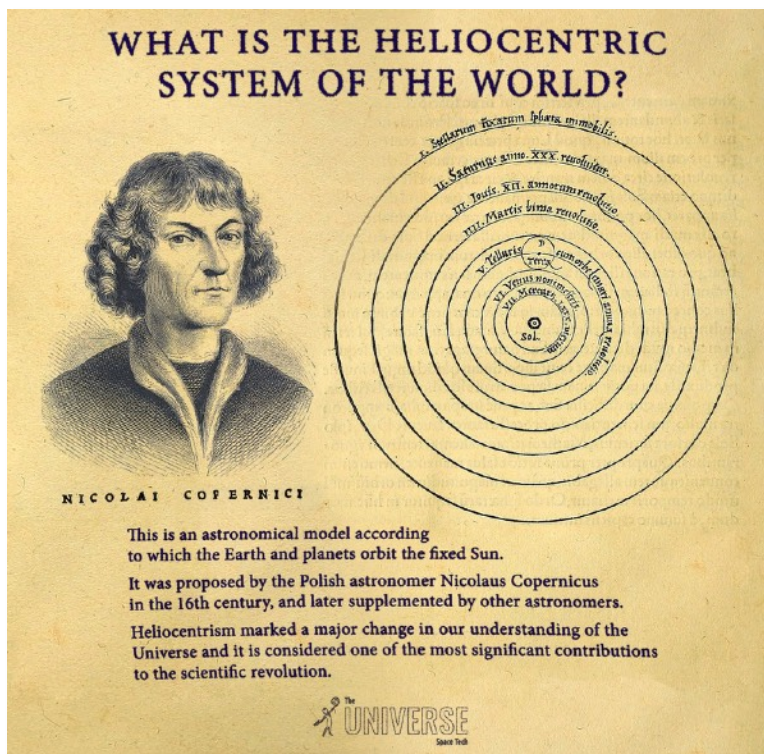
The Orava Quartet, founded in 2007 by brothers Daniel Kowalik (violin) and Karol Kowalik (cello), Thomas Chawner (viola), and David Dalseno (violin), is one of the most exciting string quartets of its generation. Known for their passionate and engaging performances, they have been hailed by The Australian as, “the future of Australian Chamber Music, the real deal.”

In 2018 Orava Quartet was the first ever Australian string quartet to release an album under the prestigious label Deutsche Grammophon - produced and distributed worldwide by Universal Music Australia. Their first album, featuring music by Tchaikovsky, Rachmaninov and Shostakovch and a collaboration with Australian Soprano Greta Bradman, was recieved to great acclaim, and in 2023 Orava Quartet will release their second album under the same label.

Orava Quartet has toured throughout Canada, the United States, New Zealand, United Arab Emirates, China, Hong Kong, Singapore and Philippines. Performing for Queen Sofia of Spain and Pope Benedict XVI. As graduate Quartet-in-Residence at the University of Colorado (USA), they had the privilege of working closely with the world-renowned Takács Quartet from 2012-2014. During this time the Quartet were selected to be part of the Juilliard String Quartet Seminar in New York City, and toured extensively in the US including at the National Gallery in Washington, D.C. The Quartet also made their debut at the Sydney Opera House for VIVID Festival (in PLANETARIUM: Sufjan Stevans, Bryce Dessner and Nico Muhly) and won two major awards at the 2013 Asia Pacific Chamber Music Competition in Melbourne, including the Musica Viva Australia Tony Berg Award for ‘Most Outstanding Australian Ensemble’.



Stopped the Sun, moved the Earth



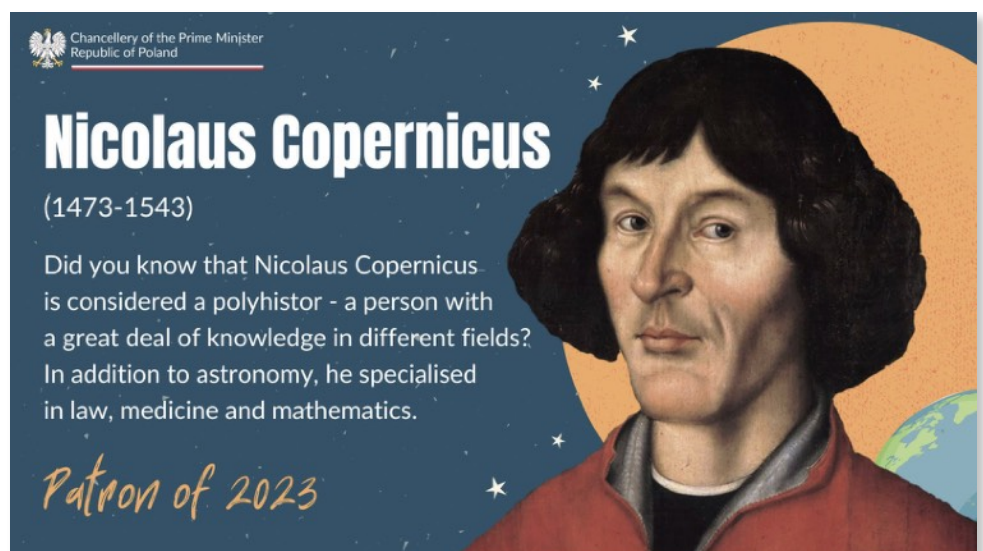
Nicolaus Copernicus (Mikołaj Kopernik in Polish) was born 550 years ago on February 19, 1473 in Toruń, in the Kingdom of Poland. He became a mathematician and astronomer, famous to this day as the one “who stopped the Sun and moved the Earth.” He was also a clergyman of the Roman-Catholic Church.

In his opus magnum “De revolutionibus orbium coelestium” (“On the Revolutions of the Celestial Spheres”) he formulated a model of the universe that placed the Sun, rather than the Earth, at the center of

the universe. In 1543 it was a major scientific event that triggered the Scientific Revolution.

Copernicus, like other Renaissance scholars, had a wide range of interests. He was involved in medicine, mathematics, law, cartography, diplomacy, philology and even military strategy. He was driven by curiosity, and his courage of thought and persistence in the pursuit of truth helped him make important discoveries.

February 19, the day of Copernicus’ birthday, is celebrated as the Day of Polish Science. Moreover, back in 2022 the Polish Senate unanimously passed a resolution establishing 2023 as the Year of Nicolaus Copernicus.



A few facts about Poland

Poland's flag is white and red. The colours were adopted in 1831 and the national flag was officially adopted in 1919.

The National emblem features the White Eagle and has been Poland's coat of arms for a thousand years. Legend has it that the White Eagle emblem originated when Poland's legendary founder Lech saw a white eagle's nest. When he looked at the bird, a ray of sunshine from the red setting sun fell on its wings, so they appeared tipped with gold; the rest of the eagle was pure white. He was delighted and decided to settle there and placed the eagle on his emblem.

Poland has been invaded or has fought for freedom in insurrections 43 times from 1600 to 1945.

The highest mountain in Australia was named in 1839 by Polish explorer Sir Paul Edmund Strzelecki as Mount Kosciuszko because of the mountain's resemblance to the Kosciuszko Mound in Kraków, Poland.

Poland's national anthem is Dąbrowski's Mazurka.

The capital of Poland is Warsaw.



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The national holiday is Constitution Day, May 3.

Poland's currency is the zloty (PLN).

The area of Poland is 312,679 sq km (120,728 sq mi).

Poland is part of the European Union, NATO and the United Nations.

Poland boasts 17 Nobel prize winners, including four Peace Prizes and five in Literature. Polish born Marie Curie Skłodowska (1867 – 1934) was the first and only Nobel laureate in two different sciences and first female professor at the Sorbonne University.

Famous musical composer Fryderyk Chopin was Polish.

Polish born astronomer Nicolaus Copernicus (1473 – 1543) was the first person to propose that the earth was not the centre of the universe.

Saint John Paul the Great – Pope John Paul II – also known as Karol Wojtyła (1920 – 2005) was Polish.

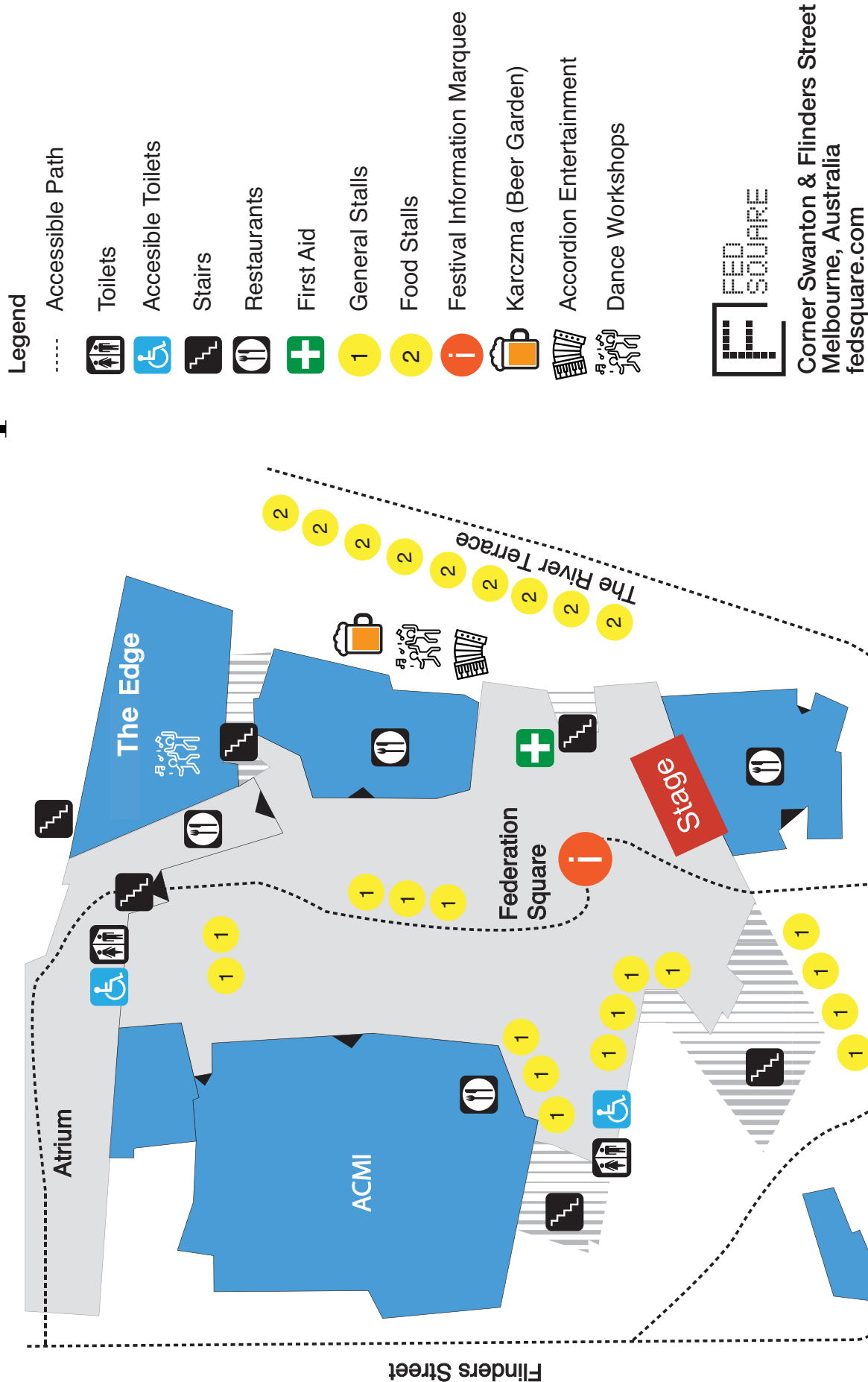

Victoria's Polish connection



- Victoria has the highest concentration of people of Polish decent in Australia with almost 62,500 residents.
- In 1839, Sir Paweł Edmund Strzelecki made a geological and mineralogical survey of the Gippsland region of eastern Victoria, where he made many discoveries. He is credited for naming Mt Kosciuszko, Gippsland, Lake King, Perry River and the Strzelecki Ranges.
- During World War I, a Polish Fund Committee was formed in Melbourne. With considerable help from Dame Nellie Melba and other prominent Australians. The Committee collected funds to assist the victims of war in Poland.
- After WWII, from 1947 to 1954 60,000 displaced Poles called Australia their home. Today, there are over 180,000 Poles living throughout the Australian states and territories.
- The Polish Community Council of Victoria Inc. (Federacja Polskich Organizacji w Wiktorii) was established in 1962 as the state's peak Polish organisation or federation of Victoria's Polish associations, organisations and individual grouping of Polish migrants.
- Polonez Polish Folk Song and Dance Ensemble of Melbourne, was formed in Melbourne in October 1965. Generations of Poles have now participated in Polonez with current membership at 100 singers and dancers.
- ZHP, the Polish Scouting Association in Victoria, has conducted its scouting activities continuously for more than 60 years in Victoria including representing Polish Australian Scouts at World Jamborees.
- In 1973 Cardinal Karol Wojtyła, later Saint John Paul II, blessed the Polish Marian Shrine in Essendon.
- During the period 1980-1991 there was another wave of Polish migration to Australia as a result of the emergence of the Solidarity trade union movement and the declaration of martial law in Poland at the end of 1981. Many of these migrants arrived as refugees.
- In 2005, the Victorian Department of Primary Industry created the Strzelecki Awards. Named in honour of Polish explorer and mineralogist, Sir Paweł Edmund de Strzelecki, the awards recognise outstanding achievements in the area of sustainable development within the Victorian earth resource industries.
